Summer Reading

Second Grade Students - August 2017



Dear Parents,

Your child has grown to be a very good reader this year. He or she has gained many reading skills that need to be practiced over the summer to ensure retention. Summer reading is the bridge between the end of one school year and the beginning of the next school year.

To further develop reading appreciation and to practice reading strategies, all second grade students will be expected to read 2 required books. Of course, we encourage more than the 2 books recommended. A simple rule of thumb for helping your child select books at their reading level is to have them choose a page from the book (not the first page) and read it aloud to you. If he or she does not know five or more words, then the book is too hard for pleasant reading. Please decide when it is necessary to read a story along with your child.

Below are a few reading strategies that you may wish to you use with your child so he or she receives the maximum benefit from the summer reading experience:

- Pre-read the story by examining the illustrations
- Use phonics to decode words
- Make and confirm predictions
- Sequence events and summarize the story
- Re-read the story: silently, orally, or together
- Identify the beginning, middle, and end of the story
- Identify the problem and the solution in the story
- Select special words you wish to remember and add them to a notebook

Upon returning to school, your child will take the Accelerated Reader (AR) comprehension test on their book.
